Academic Overview: Roxbury Latin is known for offering a rigorous and sophisticated academic program, and the school is lucky to have a student body comprising academically advanced and intellectually curious young men. Students who enroll at RL come with the understanding that they will be challenged, pushed, and expected to partake in a course load that adequately prepares them for college academia and life beyond. When it comes to college admission, match matters most for us, and our students regularly match at the top colleges and universities. We have long believed that A and B level work at RL prepares students for the challenge of collegiate coursework, and RL students typically go on to thrive in similarly fast-paced and stimulating environments.

Our Students: Roxbury Latin seeks and enrolls bright, energetic, talented students, committed to exploring and developing their many skills. Most boys attend Roxbury Latin for six years. In recent years, the school's admit rate has hovered around 17%; our yield is typically near 90%. Each year, the admit rate at Grade 9, our other major entry point (10–12 boys), is lower than that of Grade 7.

Socio-Economics: We cherish the socio-economic diversity of the school. Roxbury Latin is need-blind and meets the entirety of the demonstrated need of our families. To ensure accessibility to middle-income families, tuition at Roxbury Latin is approximately \$20,000 less than that of other Boston-area independent schools. The education of every student is substantially subsidized by our endowment, and the average contribution of a family receiving financial aid is \$13,252, enabling access to families across the socio-economic spectrum.

Weighted GPA: On the Secondary School Report you will find a weighted GPA for each applicant. We work on a 9-point scale (9 = A+, 8 = A, etc.) and include all major courses completed in Grades 9-11. We update the GPA at the conclusion of the first semester of the senior year. We add one "quality point" for all courses designated as Honors, AP, or Advanced, and any classes taught at an accelerated rate (e.g., Latin 1–2, Latin 2–3, and Multivariable Calculus). Using data from Grades 9–11, the highest weighted GPA achieved in the Class of 2024 was 9.03. We do not provide class rank.

Academic Calendar and Course Load: We operate on a traditional semester calendar. Students in Grades 11 and 12 are not allowed to take more than five major courses per semester. The only exception to this policy is the senior-year Arts elective.

Requirements for Diploma:

- English: Required every year.
- Math: Required through the end of the sophomore year and/or the completion of Geometry. Students complete Algebra in our eighth grade. Our Analysis with Trigonometry is a Pre-Calculus course.

- Science: Math-Science Investigations is required in Grade 9; two additional core laboratory science courses (Physics, Chemistry, or Biology) are required in Grades 10-12.
- Languages: Latin and either French or Spanish through the third-year level. (Students can opt for Ancient Greek in place of a third year of modern language.) Anything beyond the third-year level of Latin, Spanish, or French reflects a deep commitment to languages and exceeds our requirements.
- History: Western Civilization is required in Grade 9; U.S. History is required in Grade 11 or 12.
- All freshmen take half-credit arts electives; sophomores take two one-semester arts electives.
- Seniors must complete a month-long Independent Study Project in the spring, including a written summation and an oral presentation.
- Involvement in team sports or independent physical education is mandated throughout a boy's time at the school.

Our Move Away from AP Courses: After nearly a decade of analysis, reflection, and discussion, the Roxbury Latin faculty voted to abandon all Advanced Placement courses in the spring of 2023. The 2023-2024 academic year was the last year that AP courses were offered. The decision was motivated by several factors, most notably a desire to promote and enhance our own Honors courses and regain control of two critical weeks of teaching and learning in May.

For the Class of 2025, while a few AP courses could appear on some sophomore and junior course selections, no seniors will be enrolled in any AP classes. Given the fact that we did not offer AP courses in all subjects even prior to the 2024-2025 school year, our top scholars in the Class of 2025 may have 3 AP courses on their **transcript**; it would be highly unusual for a student to have more than 3 in that time.

Students will not be permitted to miss school in the spring to sit for AP examinations at other venues.

All courses at Roxbury Latin are taught at a rapid pace and with rigorous expectations. Our selective admit rate, 380-year history of commitment to academic excellence, and scrupulous standards make us confident that our home-grown courses prepare young men for the challenge of collegiate courses, and that this new freedom allows our faculty to hone our students' analytical and interdisciplinary talents.

Our most demanding sections receive an "Honors" or "Advanced" designation. Honors sections, however, are not offered in the following subjects:

Three scholars were recognized in the Hispanic Recognition Program, three in the African American Recognition Program, and one student was recognized in both.

Nota bene:

- If a student "doubles" in languages, he has a hard time fitting in three years of laboratory science.
- Recent curricular additions: Race and Gender in America, Law & Philosophy, Ancient Religions, Three Caribbean Islands, Contemporary Global Issues, and History of the Civil Rights Movement.

- Annually some students undertake semester- or year-long tutorials, focusing on topics of interest across the disciplines.
- The Applied Art course includes both art history and studio art components. Applied Art is a full course, which we consider on par with classes in all other disciplines. We also now offer a half course titled Topics in Art, for seniors particularly interested in the arts.

Discipline: The school's fundamental precept is: "Honesty is expected in all dealings." Our students, therefore, are required to be forthright in explaining any suspension that occurs during grades 9-12 in their applications to colleges that request such information. Our office will also engage in dialogue regarding suspensions with admissions representatives whenever they wish to discuss the matter over the phone or via Zoom. In every case, if a student was not asked to leave the school, he has earned our full and unwavering support.

On- and Off-Campus Extracurriculars: Students spend dedicated time each afternoon committed to a range of pursuits from athletics, to performance, to publications. Throughout the year, boys commit themselves to many service opportunities, either elective or as a class, extending long-standing and meaningful connections around the City of Boston. The majority of boys take advantage of school-sponsored and subsidized opportunities to travel abroad for cultural and linguistic immersion.

History and Mission: In our 380th year, Roxbury Latin is the oldest school in continuous existence in North America. We are a small, independent day school for boys in grades 7–12. Our students commute from all the various neighborhoods in the City of Boston and from more than 40 surrounding towns. The campus comprises 117 acres in West Roxbury, a residential neighborhood in the southwestern corner of Boston.

John Eliot founded the school in 1645 with the mission of preparing boys for lives of public service. The school remains deeply committed to its original ideals and classical heritage. We stress honesty, simplicity, humility, respect, and concern for others, focusing on readying young men for lives of purpose and meaning. While we celebrate our students' academic achievements, our primary concern is the moral character of our boys.
